### Fraternal Awards of Excellence

Each spring, the Iowa State Greek Community presents its Fraternal Awards of Excellence, recognizing chapters that excel in the strategic areas of academics, civic engagement, friendship, leadership, and social justice.

The highest distinction is the President's Award for Fraternal Excellence. Among the more than 50 fraternities and sororities represented in the Interfraternity Council, Collegiate Panhellenic Council, Multicultural Greek Council, and National Pan-Hellenic Council, only five chapters earn a place in the President's Circle.

This year, Iowa Beta was honored to be among those five chapters. Even more notably, we received the President's Cup, awarded to the chapter earning the highest overall score. This marks the first time since rechartering that Iowa Beta has received the President's Cup, and represents a significant milestone in the chapter's history.

The recognition did not stop there. Junior Carson Ekis was named the Interfraternity Council's Outstanding President for 2025, another first for an Iowa Beta chapter president since rechartering.

In addition, junior Thomas Roth was one of only five recipients of the Director's Award, selected by Iowa State's Director of Sorority and Fraternity Engagement for exceptional support of the broader Greek community.

Between earning Phi Kappa Psi's 2025 Grand Chapter Award and Iowa State's 2025 President's Cup, it has been a remarkable year for Iowa Beta.

## Greek Week

Iowa Beta enjoyed another successful Greek Week, finishing second among 15 pairings. Over the past four years, we have placed either first or second three times. Our partner chapter this year was Sigma Kappa, and together we embraced the theme, "Rio: Greeks of a Feather."

Competition results were especially strong. We placed first in broomball, first in soccer, and third in volleyball, earning first place overall in the Tournaments category.

We also excelled in Polar Bear Plunge, the Greek Community's annual fundraiser benefiting Special Olympics Iowa. Once again, the Iowa State Greek Community raised more money for this cause than any other organization in the state, generating an impressive \$369,153. Based on both fundraising and participation, our pairing placed third overall.

Additional recognitions included second place in ISU Trivia and Best Plot in Lip Sync.

## Philanthropy and Community Service

For several years, Phi Kappa Psi chapters across the country have worked to raise awareness about the dangers of distracted driving. The initiative began after Hunter Watson, an undergraduate member of Phi Kappa Psi at Syracuse University, was killed by a distracted driver. In response, his pledge brothers established a campus safe-driving program that eventually evolved into Hunter's Fund, which now serves as Phi Kappa Psi's national philanthropy. The program works to reduce distracted-driving accidents while honoring Hunter's memory and creative spirit.

The cause resonates deeply with Iowa Beta. In 2014, our own brother **Paul Troupe, '11-1402**, was killed by a distracted driver just six months after his graduation and marriage.

This year, the chapter added a new fundraising component. In addition to educational outreach and campus tabling, the brothers hosted a petting zoo, selling tickets to support Hunter's Fund. The event drew an enthusiastic crowd and helped expand awareness of the program's mission.

Other service activities continued throughout the semester. Brothers conducted a food drive and volunteered multiple shifts with Food at First, an Ames nonprofit dedicated to combating hunger and food insecurity. We also participated in Iowa's Adopt-A-Highway program, cleaned a local disc golf park, and collected clothing for donation to the Salvation Army.

The chapter teamed up with its Sigma Kappa sorority to write cards to send to residents of nursing homes and to raise some dollars for the National Council on Aging. For a modest charge, attendees got to load up on hot chocolate with all of the extra toppings, and to throw pies at the hosts.

The chapter partnered with Cultivating Hope Farms, helping organize and staff its spring carnival. The organization creates opportunities for inclusion and acceptance for individuals with autism and other disabilities.

A new service partnership this semester was with The Arc of Story County. Brothers spent time engaging directly with participants through art activities, basketball, spikeball, cornhole, and other recreational events that promote inclusion and community.

## Professional Development

**Explore** is a relatively new program created by the Phi Psi Foundation. The multi-day externship program gives undergraduate brothers the opportunity to see classroom concepts applied in real world settings while gaining valuable insights into industry operations, culture, and career opportunities.

One version of the program focuses on careers in real estate, construction, engineering, architecture, and design, and is held annually in New York City. This year's program took place over winter break, and Iowa Beta brothers Will Thomas and Thomas Roth were selected by the Foundation to participate.

## Socials and Brotherhood Events

Remembering that the "f" in fraternity stands for fun, the chapter enjoyed a full calendar of social and brotherhood events throughout the semester.

Social events included speed dating with Sigma Kappa, dinner with the Sigma Kappa executive team, an Easter egg hunt with Alpha Delta Pi, a water-balloon fight with Delta Gamma, yoga and Pilates with Pi Beta Phi, and a nighttime

game of Ghost in the Graveyard with Chi Omega. The semester concluded with a formal in Kansas City.

Brotherhood events included Mom's Day, an outing to Perfect Games featuring bowling and laser tag, and chapter pools for both March Madness and the Masters Tournament.

Our social chairs, Noah Clark and Bennett Moen, along with our brotherhood chairs, Nick Hoberg and Nate Rath, helped ensure that brothers spent plenty of time together away from their screens.

### Scholarships Awarded Spring Semester

#### Most Valuable Brother Award

The **Most Valuable Brother Award** is a \$1,000 scholarship awarded through the ISU Foundation to the brother who has made the greatest positive impact on the chapter during the semester, as determined by the chapter membership. Two awards are presented each semester: one to an underclassman (first- or second-year student) and one to an upperclassman (third year of college or above).

The scholarship was established and initially funded by **James P. Grabenbauer, '73-948**, with assistance from **Jerry A. Soper, '73-956**. Additional contributions sufficient to endow the scholarship were later provided by **Gary F. Short, '58-699**, before his passing. Gary's gift honored his brother, **Robert E. (Bob) Short, '59-712**; his father-in-law, **Charles F. (Chuc) Mason, '21-109**; his brother-in-law, **Charles R. (Dick) Mason, '61-756**; and **Arthur C. (Con) Short, '56-670**.

**Carson Ekis, '23-1784**, a Marketing major from Waukee, Iowa, was the upperclassman recipient for spring 2026. Carson served as chapter president during 2025, a year in which Iowa Beta earned both the Grand Chapter Award from the National Fraternity and the President's Cup from the Iowa State Greek community. He was also recognized as IFC President of the Year. On campus, Carson is a member of the Order of Omega honor society and has served on the executive team of the ISU Blood Drive.

**Tyler Japel, '25-1842**, a Statistics major from Lakeville, Minnesota, was the underclassman recipient. Tyler currently serves as chapter president, an impressive accomplishment considering he was initiated only a year earlier, in April 2025. He previously served as community service co-chair. On campus, he has been active with the ISU Blood Drive, serving on its Partnership and Outreach Committee.

## Paul T. Troupe Emerging Leaders Award

The **Paul T. Troupe Emerging Leaders Award** is a \$1,000 scholarship awarded annually through the Phi Psi Foundation to first-year brothers who demonstrate the potential to become future chapter leaders. Two scholarships are awarded each year.

The endowed scholarship honors **Paul T. Troupe, '11-1402**, who was tragically killed by a distracted driver only months after graduating from Iowa State, marrying his college sweetheart, and beginning his professional career. The award was established and funded by Paul's parents, Doug and Sherri Troupe, as a tribute to Paul and his relationship with Phi Kappa Psi.

Recipients for the 2025-2026 academic year were **Ben Wede, '25-1850**, a Supply Chain Management major from Elmhurst, Illinois, and **Nick Bafia, '25-1853**, a Software Engineering major from Mokena, Illinois. Both have been active participants in chapter life since their initiation and have already demonstrated strong leadership potential.

Ben served as community service co-chair during the spring semester and will continue in that role this fall while also representing the chapter in IFC. Nick serves as one of the chapter's summer recruitment co-chairs.

## Kyle L. Goodell Spirit Award

The **Kyle L. Goodell Spirit Award** is a \$500 scholarship awarded each semester through the Phi Psi Foundation to a brother who best exemplifies the spirit of Kyle L. Goodell, particularly through participation and leadership in the creative and performance-oriented aspects of chapter life.

The endowed scholarship honors **Kyle L. Goodell '18-1566**, who died in an automobile accident shortly after graduation. It was established and funded by Kyle's parents, Todd and Donna Goodell, as a tribute

to Kyle and his relationship with Phi Kappa Psi.

The spring 2026 recipient was **Eddie Bouchard, '24-1835**, a Finance major from Altoona, Iowa. Since joining the chapter, Eddie has served as house manager and has been actively involved in alumni relations, Yell Like Hell, Lip Sync, and countless other chapter activities. His enthusiasm, energy, and willingness to get involved embody the spirit that this award was created to recognize.

## William and Lindy Good Scholarship

The **William and Lindy Good Scholarship** is a \$5,000 scholarship awarded annually through the Phi Psi Foundation. The award recognizes a brother — typically a senior — who has devoted substantial effort to strengthening Iowa Beta during his undergraduate years and who shows promise for continued involvement with the chapter as an alumnus.

Recipients are selected by a committee appointed by the House Corporation Board. Current committee members are **Rick Garrett, '70-897**, **Umang Patel, '07-1328**, and **Jordan Swanson, '19-1631**.

The endowed scholarship was funded through a generous gift from **Dennis L. Stanley, '70-893**, and his wife, Sherri, to honor **Bill, '69-864**, and **Lindy Good** for their transformational impact on the Iowa Beta Chapter. The Stanleys' gift serves both as a recognition of the Goods' decades of leadership and as an inspiration to future generations of Iowa Beta leaders.

**Nathan Hander, '22-1742**, a Finance major from Venice, Florida, was selected as the recipient of the 2025-2026 award. During his undergraduate career, Nate has served as vice president, fraternity education co-chair, brotherhood co-chair, house manager, and summer recruitment co-chair. He previously received the Paul T. Troupe Emerging Leaders Award, the Most Valuable Brother Award, and the Most Valuable Executive Member Award.

Outside the chapter, Nate has held leadership positions with both the ISU Blood Drive and Dance Marathon. He has also earned Dean's List recognition every semester of his college career.

## Other Scholarships

The Phi Psi Foundation awards several scholarships each year to Phi Psis from around the nation. These are from funds unrelated to dedicated Iowa Beta funds. Two of our members received national scholarships this year.

**Drew Schindel, '23-1801**, received one of two \$2,500 Founders Graduate Awards. These are for members who are in graduate school now or who will enter graduate school next fall. Academic standing, leadership, and character are the primary considerations for the awards.

**Keaton Bertrand, '22-1757**, received a \$3,000 District Award. Currently four \$3,000 scholarships are awarded in each of the Fraternity's six districts. Iowa Beta is in District V which has 15 chapters. Desired candidates are to have demonstrated dedication to academic excellence, a commitment to serving others, and a devotion to Phi Kappa Psi.

If you are in Ames, be sure to stop by and see the walkway. It stands as a visible reminder of the loyalty and generosity of Iowa Beta alumni across more than a century of chapter history.
