lowa Beta continues to do well in the classroom. Our 3.38 spring semester GPA placed us third among 28 IFC fraternities. This marks the 12th semester in a row that we have placed in the top five. And going all the way back to spring semester 2008, (31 semesters), we have placed in the top 10 in 28 of those semesters, and always in the top half.

Each year as spring semester wraps up, the Greek Community presents its Fraternal Awards of Excellence. These awards recognize chapters that excel in the strategic areas of the Sorority and Fraternity Community. These areas include academics, civic engagement, friendship, leadership, and social justice.

This year, for the second year in a row, Phi Psi received one of the President's Awards. Only five chapters received this honor this year, out of about 57 chapters in the entire Greek Community.

In addition to that, the chapter received the IFC award

for its programming on social justice.

And finally, senior Gannon White was one of five recipients of the Director's Award, the recipients of which are chosen by the ISU Director of Sorority and Fraternity Engagement for their constant support of the overall Greek Community.

The best week of the year turned out really well for Phi Psi. This year we were paired with Gamma Phi Beta sorority, and what a good pairing it was.

In Tournaments, we placed third in volleyball, third in broomball, and first in soccer. Overall, we placed first in Tournaments.

In the Saturday Greek Olympics, we won LARP and Bed Races and were second in Tug-o-War. Overall, we placed second in Olympics.

Our team did extremely well in Polar Bear Plunge, raising \$30,867 for Special Olympics of Iowa out of a total of \$254,360 raised by the entire Greek Community. And our own Andrew Ross received the Golden Plunger award for having the most donors (58). Overall, we placed first in Polar Bear Plunge.

The Greek Week grand finale is always held Saturday night in C.Y. Stephens Auditorium, where those teams making the cut perform in Karaoke and Lip Sync. Our team's good fortune continued as we placed third in Karaoke, and first in Lip Sync (and had the best plot as well).

All of the awards were presented Sunday afternoon in front of the entire Greek Community, again in Stephens Auditorium. And when it was all said and done, out of 15 teams, our team won Greek Week.

### **Philanthropy and Community Service**

As noted previously, we really pushed hard during Greek Week to raise money for the lowa Special Olympics. In addition, we raised money through our customary spring semester philanthropy. The event had a different spin this year. Instead of a baseball theme — Phi Psi Sliders — the theme was deep-fat fried food — Phi Psi Deep Fry. The profits went to the Make-A-Wish Foundation, which we have been supporting in recent semesters.

Besides just raising money, we made blankets with Chi Omega to donate to local hospitals, cleaned our strip along Highway 30 in the Adopt-A-Highway program, helped move risers for the Ames Children's Choir, and collected shoes for those in need in the Ames community.

### **Recent House Improvements**

Several improvements were made to the house in the last academic year. A new door lock system was installed for the outside doors. Instead of punching in a code to open the doors, members now open the doors using their ISU card (about the size of a credit card or hotel room key). This allows tighter control on who has access, and it eliminates the hassle of having to frequently change the door code when non-members "somehow" learn of the code.

Additional ductwork was installed in the HVAC system to help facilitate return air flow and to better sound-proof the upstairs rooms.

And this summer, the carpet in the upstairs study rooms (now 17 years old on second floor and 15 years old on third floor) will be replaced with luxury vinyl tile. The hard surfaces will be easier to clean on an ongoing basis and will eliminate the need to periodically employ carpet cleaners.

## Mission Statement: Our Four Pillars

Phi Kappa Psi operates under the idea of four pillars: Service, Leadership, Scholarship, and Brotherhood. The four pillars, which are represented prominently outside the Iowa Beta Chapter House, continue to be a guide for its operation today.

Service: Iowa Beta proudly emphasizes the importance of service amongst all of its members by hosting biannual philanthropic events and frequent service events that benefit organizations like the American Red Cross, YSS, and the Make-A-Wish Foundation.

Leadership: Members of the chapter are actively involved in leadership positions across campus. Phi Psi's can be found at the ISU Blood Drive, Engineering and Business Career Fairs, and the ISU Dance Marathon.

Scholarship: Iowa Beta recognizes the value of higher education and the reason members are at Iowa State in the first place. Our commitment to academic achievement has resulted in our chapter continually ranking among the top of all fraternities on campus in GPA.

Brotherhood: Last but certainly not least, the brothers at lowa Beta frequently host and participate in events that promote strong friendships and lifelong bonds. The chapter commonly hosts sports tournaments, fireside chats, and general camaraderie on the chapter's expansive front lawn at 316 Lynn Ave.

### Spotlight on: Samuel Kennedy III, '70-883

The Kennedy family has a long history with Iowa State and Iowa Beta. It started with my great uncle who was one of the first civil engineering graduates from lowa State. My father, Jack Kennedy, '47-435, was drafted at age 19 for World War II. The sergeant, after completing his interview, said, "In three months you will be on the front line." Minutes later, the major who was in charge scolded the sergeant, saying, "This is the man we've been looking for: he was valedictorian of his class. We want him to lead the Signal Corps." And so he did, and he survived World War II. After the war, he came to Iowa State on the Veterans' bill and pledged Phi Psi. He received a degree in engineering. His best friends in life were his two fraternity brothers, Allan Wind, '45-472, and Dave Hamilton, '43-370.

I went through rush week in 1969 determined not to be a Phi Psi as my father was. I received bids from four houses. However, at the end of the day, Phi Psi was the only place for me. I served as treasurer with Bill Good, '69-864. The house had financial issues at the time. We had a live-in cook during my time in the house (first Wilma, then Alice), and at that time we had home-cooked meals five days a week with leftovers on the weekends. I took over the commissary. We bought beef by the half. I furnished whole hogs plus 100-pound bags of carrots, potatoes, and onions from my father's produce. Bill collected the past dues. We made ends meet. We had an issue with the fire marshal, who was going to close the house because we did not have a fire escape from the carport dorm room. My pledge dad, Jerry Slessor, '69-876, and I purchased a second-timearound fire escape stair ladder from Des Moines and spent a weekend welding it together to meet the requirements. We also had issues with our second-floor shower. Norm Klootwyt, '70-880 (whose father was a plumber in Marshalltown), Jerry, and I put in a new lead base and retiled the shower. We had a swimming pool at that time. It collapsed during a rainstorm. We hand-dug it out and put drain tile around the perimeter, draining into the parking lot so it would not happen again, and replaced the pool. We did it ourselves.

At that time, I had my own livestock operation. I took many of my brothers back to Clear Lake to help me on weekends or to go hunting. We hunted quail with **Doug Peterschmidt**, '71-914, and hunted geese with **Tom Bean**, '68-850, and **Bob Peters**, '68-852. We kept shotguns in our rooms. I took extra credits (I had a receptive advisor) and received my first degree in three years, going back two winter quarters for a second. My pledge son, **Al Roper**, '70-903, married

my sister, Sally, and became my brotherin-law. I was the best man at his wedding, and he was a groomsman in mine. As a freshman, I was interviewing seniors from the Farmhouse Fraternity to work on my hog operation in Clear Lake.

After ISU, I went back to Clear Lake and, up through 1995, worked with my father in his farming operation and my own livestock operation (where we raised over 50,000 hogs); ran an international livestock equipment company; owned my own national feed company, grain elevators, and a construction company; and was Chairman of the Iowa Department of Natural Resources. One of my father's chapter contemporaries, Don Hattery, '48-494, head of the Shive-Hattery Architectural Firm in Cedar Rapids, became my "non-paid" adviser for all Iowa DNR construction. He definitely made an impact.

I met my wife, Denise, in a construction review while building the Stanley, Idaho, Post Office. She was the construction/leasing agent for the State of Idaho and Northern Utah. Subsequently, we married in Park City, Utah. On my wedding day, I promised that if she didn't like lowa in five years, I would move. She gave me seven. Retiring from the first phase of my life, we moved with two small boys to Coeur d'Alene, Idaho, where we established Cisco's Gallery, a Native American and western art and artifact gallery in 1996, which I continue to operate today (www. ciscosgallery.com).

Our older son, Colton, '09-1369, graduated from Iowa State in mathematics and engineering. He received an advanced degree at Duke University, and now is head of corporate planning for Omaha Public Power. His wife, Courtney, is also an Iowa State graduate. They recently purchased 70 acres with a 7-acre lake about an hour south of Omaha.

Our younger son, **Hunter**, '14-1476, received an interior design degree from lowa State, and after working with a design firm in Des Moines, is now helping in the gallery and in the process of opening a greenhouse/garden center, as he loves to "work in the dirt." For both boys, I thought lowa State was worth paying the price of

out of state tuition. Phi Psi was not part of the requirement but they both made the same decision I did, finding it the "best fit."

our sons have instrumental in advancing our business. With a website started by Colton six years ago, online sales (mainly decorating second homes) are significant. We work on projects throughout the United States and overseas, and have some interesting clients. About 15 years ago, when a man and his wife walked into the gallery, my associate and assistant told me, "You ought to pay attention to him." I said. "Why?" He replied, "He's John Elway." I said, "Who is John Elway?" (I spend my time hunting and fishing.) We ended up designing John's lake home in Coeur

During another call, my same assistant said, "Sam, this guy wants to buy a \$20K Black Forest Hall Tree." I said, "Who is it? I didn't catch his name." We talked for 20 minutes. I knew the voice: it was German, but couldn't place it. He gave me his "want" list with an address in Sun Valley and an office in Oakland. He promised a lot of future business. Closing the deal, I hung up the phone and said, "I made a \$15K sale but won't know to whom until I get the check." About 45 minutes later, his office manager called and said, "You really gave Arnold (Schwarzenegger) a hard time today. It was good for him — it doesn't happen very often." We furnished props for Kevin Costner movies. Wayne Gretzky is a local client. I could continue. Although I still manage the gallery with a very competent staff and both sons assisting, I am able to take off more time for hunting, fishing, and gardening in my vineyard and orchard, making our own wine and hard cider.


Coeur d'Alene is an amazing place: it has 16 golf courses within 30 miles, the only floating green, and four ski slopes. Coeur d'Alene Lake is rated as one of the top five most beautiful in the United States. Summers are mild, with evenings ending in the 50s, and the big lake doesn't freeze in winter.

I especially enjoyed the 100-year anniversary last summer in Ames, reconnecting with many brothers I hadn't seen since graduation. Brothers are welcome anytime, as guest facilities are available. I still have lowa ties with my mother, 97, and my brother at Clear Lake, with a large pheasant hunting property and ranch in Albia for deer and turkeys. I'm taking off time this spring to hunt turkeys in seven states and Mexico on long weekends.

### Most Valuable Brother Award

The Most Valuable Brother Award is a \$1,000 scholarship awarded through the ISU Foundation to the brother who has made the most positive impact on the chapter during the semester, as determined by the chapter. Two awards are presented each semester, one to an underclassman (first or second year of college) and one to an upperclassman (third year of college or above).

This scholarship was created and funded by James P. Grabenbauer, '73-948, with some initial help from Jerry A. Soper, '73-956. Contributions sufficient to endow the scholarship were added by Gary F. Short, '58-699, before his passing, to honor his brother, Robert E. (Bob) Short, '59-712, father-in-law Charles F. (Chuc) Mason, '21-109, brother-in-law Charles R. (Dick) Mason, '61-756, and Arthur C. (Con) Short, '56-670.

Braden Senne, '20-1693, a Business Analytics major from Dallas Center, IA, was the upperclassman recipient of the Spring 2023 Award. Braden is currently serving the chapter as Chaplain (HI) and VP of Development, overseeing scholarship, professional development, community service, brotherhood, health and wellness, mental health, and diversity, equity, and inclusion. Prior to that, he was the chapter's Vice President (VGP) and VP of Internal Affairs, overseeing governing, house, stewards, risk management, and judicial review. On campus, he has been active in committee work with the ISU Blood Drive.

Camden Lloyd, '21-1703, a Marketing and Management major from Norwalk, IA, was the underclassman recipient of the Spring 2023 Award. Camden has served the chapter as Corresponding Secretary (AG), social chairman, and community service chairman. He has been a chapter delegate to the GAC and to the Association of Fraternal Leadership & Values conference. On campus, he has been involved with ISU Blood Drive committee work and is currently the VP of Recruitment for the Interfraternity Council (IFC).

### Paul T. Troupe Emerging Leaders Award

The Paul T. Troupe Emerging Leaders Award is a \$500 scholarship awarded annually through the Phi Psi Foundation to a first-year brother who shows promise to be a future leader of the chapter, as determined by the chapter. Two scholarships are given each year.

This endowed scholarship honors Paul T. Troupe, '11-1402, who was tragically killed by a distracted driver just months after graduating from Iowa State, marrying his college sweetheart, and starting his career. It was created and funded by Paul's parents, Doug and Sherri Troupe, as a tribute to Paul and his relationship with Phi Kappa Psi.

The 2022-2023 academic year recipients were Myles Alexander, '22-1737, a Mechanical Engineering major from New Berlin, Illinois, and Nate Hander, '22-1742, a Finance and International Business major from Venice, Florida. Both men have been active chapter participants from the start and show promise for future leadership. In fact, both of them are serving as this summer's recruitment chairmen.

### Kyle L. Goodell Spirit Award

The spring semester 2023 recipient was **Danny Coughlin**, '19-1647, a Biology and Environmental Science major from Cedar Rapids. Danny has served the chapter in many ways, and is

passionate about everything he does for Phi Psi, just like Kyle was.

### Most Valuable Executive Committee Member

member that semester. The Exec member chosen for spring semester 2023 was **Will Cooper, '21-1713**, a Finance major from West Des Moines, currently serving as the chapter's Historian (SG) and Vice President of Relations.

### Other Scholarships

The Phi Psi Foundation awards several scholarships each year to Phi Psis from around the nation. These are from funds unrelated to dedicated lowa Beta funds. Three of our members received national scholarships this year.

**Louie Ervin, '19-1651**, received a \$1,000 District V scholarship. Four such scholarships were granted this year to each of the six districts. Recipients are to have demonstrated dedication to academic excellence, a commitment to serving others, and a devotion to Phi Kappa Psi.

**Evan Horak, '20-1666**, received a \$2,300 Ruddick C. Lawrence scholarship. Two such scholarships were awarded this year to students who have provided meritorious service to people or organizations outside Phi Kappa Psi.

Five Solon E. Summerfield scholarships are awarded each year, three for \$2,500, one for \$5,000, and one for \$7,500. The primary selection criteria are academic standing and leadership and service to chapter, campus, and community. The brother selected as the Outstanding Solon E. Summerfield Scholar receives the \$7,500 award. This year that went to **Ryan Schiltz**, **'21-1715**.

Evan Horak and Ryan Schiltz each received a \$2,500 Watkins Christian Scholar Award, which goes to a graduate or undergraduate who inspires his peers to fulfill all aspects of the Phi Psi Creed by demonstrating the character of Jesus Christ, and who is committed, no matter his chosen major, to advancing the Gospel within his chosen vocation.

### **Obituaries**

Arthur J. W. Weir, '41-310, of Vacaville, California, passed away on August 27, 2022, at age 101. "Jack" was born in Springfield, Missouri, in 1920. He attended high school in Mason City, Iowa, and became an accomplished French Horn player, winning many awards, including some at the national level. He attended Iowa State College for Industrial Economics and enrolled in the ROTC Program. In February 1943, as a senior, he was drafted into the Army during WWII, and graduated after completing Officer Candidate Training. He transferred to the Army Air Corps, and received his pilot's wings in 1944. In the China-Burma-India theater, he flew P-38s doing photo recon, and was then assigned to China to fly C-47s over the infamous Himalayan "Hump," known for its perilous weather at extreme altitudes. He separated from the Army Air Corps in 1946, but continued his love of aviation, flying for several companies and the California Air National Guard. In 1951, during the Korean War, he was called back to active duty in the Air Force, flying rescue missions among other assignments. Jack met the love of his life, Robbie Clenney, in 1952, and they were married in 1954. They were able to travel and see many sights, as Jack was stationed at various locations. Their son, David, was born in 1955, and Robert was born in October 1956. Jack moved on to Dover AFB and then to England. They returned to the Bay Area, being stationed at Travis Air Force Base until his retirement from the Air Force in 1971 after 25 years of service. Jack and Robbie made many lifelong friends and enjoyed their church life. Singing in the choir brought him great joy well into his 90s. He also loved his civic projects with the Vacaville Rotary. In his spare time, he enjoyed tinkering around the house and caring for his garden. He and Robbie continued to travel across the country and internationally. They often visited family and friends during these adventures. Jack leaves behind his sons, David and Robert, along with two grandchildren and two great-grandchildren.

Richard N. Peters, '46-416, passed away in Tallahassee, Florida, on April 22, 2023. He was born in 1924, in Omaha, Nebraska. On his 18th birthday, Dick enlisted in the Army Air Corps. He served in Italy near the end of the war, flying day and night missions in a C-47, delivering supplies, evacuating wounded, and ferrying troops home after VE Day. With the help of the GI bill, Dick became the first in his



family to attend college. At lowa State College he met Joyce, the love of his life. He made lifelong friends and served as president of Phi Kappa Psi. He graduated in 1949 with a degree in Engineering. The week after graduation, he began his 40-year career with Reynolds Metals Company. He retired in 1989 as President of Reynolds Aluminum Supply Company. In retirement, Joyce and Dick spent many wonderful years traveling the world. They moved to Westminster Oaks Retirement Community in Tallahassee, where they enjoyed attending as many Florida State University sporting events as possible, and hosted countless family gatherings. Dick is survived by Joyce; daughters Lynn P. Baker, Paula P. Smith, and Nancy Peters; two grandchildren; and five great-grandchildren.


