Ed Gagnier Honored



Ed Gagnier, who started the Iowa State men's gymnastics program from scratch and developed it into a national power, joined the elite of Iowa State Athletics by having a banner hung in his honor at Hilton Coliseum on February 20, 2015. Gagnier, a former Canadian Olympic gymnast and All-American at Michigan, established the Cyclone program in 1963. Three of his teams won NCAA Championships and 10 squads earned Big Eight titles. He coached 16 national champions, 54 All-Americans, and registered a 180-30-1 dual meet record. He is simply one of the most decorated coaches in his sport's history. His connection to Phi Psi? His daughter and son-in-law are chairs of our Parents' Association, and their two sons are members of the chapter. Spotlight On: Thomas J. Miller, '69-873

Tom Miller came to Iowa State from Moline, Illinois, where his dad was a machinist and manager at the John Deere Experimental Works, a facility where they built prototype farm equipment. Tom worked all four summers before his Iowa State years at Lynnwood Stone Products, a limestone mine with processing facilities outside Davenport, where he laid dynamite in the mine, drove 20-ton Euclid dump trucks and end loaders, and loaded barges on the Mississippi River! Brothers Terry King, '70-896, and Lynn Friesth, '69-874, each drove Euclids there some of those summers as well, and Jim Miller, '71-925, also worked there, so let's just say there are a lot of stories!

Tom began at Iowa State in 1968, majoring in Physics, but switched to the new Computer Science Degree program when it was first offered during his sophomore year and the Atanasoff building was brand new. Thus, Tom was in the first class of Computer Science graduates from Iowa State. He once was asked to give a talk to the Computer Science Department on "deleting an element from a binary tree," a previously unsolved problem!

At Phi Kappa Psi, Tom served two years as Co-Social Chairman with Brother Tom Marsden, '70-884, and together they created the first barn party, the first pajama party, and organized pig roasts and woodsies. The plot thickened, or downright coagulated, when Tom's brother Jim Miller, '71-925, joined Phi Psi in 1971, also pursuing a Computer Science Degree! Tom went on to earn his MS in Computer Science at the University of Illinois.

After college, Tom moved to the Boston area for his first job at Digital Equipment Corporation (DEC), where he eventually became the development lead on the RSX-11M/M+ and RSX-11S operating systems. After only 3.5 years, Tom became one of four cofounders of a computer consulting firm called Paranor AG just outside of Bern, Switzerland. The agreement to start Paranor was finalized at an automated meat processing plant at Eberswalde, East Germany, during the Cold War, where the four were working behind the Berlin Wall to solve some massive computer problems blocking completion of the factory! As a subcontractor to a larger company,



Paranor then developed a standard automation system built on the RSX-11 systems that was subsequently used to automate factories for BMW, Mercedes, Peugeot, and Fiat. Paranor went on to develop software systems for Swiss banks, the Swiss Power Company and Phone Company, and the Swiss Army before Tom left after about seven years. Paranor has grown and is now in its 37th year!

Tom returned to the U.S. in 1985 to work again with some of his old friends at DEC, but by this time his group had moved to Seattle. It was a tumultuous and frustrating period at DEC, so Tom ultimately joined a group of about 20 engineers who left DEC and joined Microsoft in 1988 and 1989. At Microsoft, they replaced the existing version of DOS-based Windows with the first version of Windows NT, which they built entirely from scratch and is the basis of the current Windows 8 and 10. Tom was the architect and lead implementer of the current NTFS file system and Cache Manager. He took an early retirement in 2000, but ended up returning to Microsoft in 2004 to work briefly on SQL Server and Exchange before returning to file systems to design and build a new ultra reliable server file system called ReFS with a new team. He is currently retired again ... for now!

About five years ago, Tom was asked to join the initial External Advisory Board (EAB) for the Computer Science Department at Iowa State. Subsequently, another EAB was formed for Software Engineering, with Tom as a member. These EABs meet once or twice a year at ISU to review curriculum and certification matters and to provide input as required by the Accreditation Board for Engineering and Technology certification process.

Tom is happily married to his wife of 24 years, Terri Olson, and has two sons, Andy (22) and Charlie (19), who, following the advice of their college counselor, both ended up going to college on the East Coast — University of Richmond and Cornell. With his family and friends, Tom continues to be an avid skier, traveler, and sailor. Tom has been a supporter of Save the Children for 30 years, and has traveled extensively on several continents with Save and with Habitat for Humanity. Locally, Tom and Terri support a minority-dominated Boys and Girls Club in South Seattle and the Seattle Repertory Theater.

Tom remembers and values his years at Iowa Beta. He had been somewhat shy and unassertive in high school, so his years at the Phi Psi house were the most formative years of his life. In Phi Psi Tom gained organizational, social, and leadership skills that have served him well in his life and career. Just a few years shy of a half-century from when he joined Phi Psi, Tom continues to enjoy some of the best and longest-lasting friendships of his life. What a rare gift it is to be able to see many brothers regularly, and other brothers for the first time in decades, and still feel friendship as fresh as ever! And then there are the stories

2015 Founders Day





2015 Most Valuable Brother Awards



The chapter chose Austin Benson, '13-1451 (L) and Adam Goldberg '13-1445 (R) as the spring 2015 recipients of the Most Valuable Brother Awards.

Austin, a senior in Computer Engineering from Cedar Rapids, Iowa, has served the chapter as VGP and as Chair of the Judicial Review, Membership Development, and Scholarship Committees. On campus, he is a member of several engineering and general honoraries, including the prestigious Cardinal Key. Austin is a 4.00 student who has had internships with IBM, Amazon, and Google. The only knock against Austin is that he didn't join the chapter until his junior year.

Adam, a sophomore in Industrial Design, also from Cedar Rapids, has served the chapter as Steward, AG, and Alumni Relations Committee Chair, and has been an active member of several committees. Next fall, he will serve the chapter as the VGP and participate in the GSB as the Senator from the Design College.

Both Austin and Adam are brothers who are always around, always involved, and willing to help out wherever there is a need. They are worthy recipients of these awards.

The Most Valuable Brother Award is a \$1,000 scholarship given to the undergraduate who has made the most positive impact on the chapter during the semester, as determined by his peers. The positive impact made by the recipient must fall within the parameters of the four pillars of the Greek Community at Iowa State, i.e., scholarship, friendship, leadership, and service. Two awards are presented each semester, one to an underclassman (first or second year of college) and one to an upperclassman (third year of college or above).

The inaugural MVB Awards were presented spring semester, 2013, thanks to the generosity of James P. Grabenbauer, '73-948, and Jerry A. Soper, '73-956, who have provided funding for these awards for the first six years.

Benny Rohloff, '11-1411, Joins Phi Psi Headquarters Staff

Benny Rohloff, a May graduate in Psychology, has joined the national office staff as an Expansion Consultant. As such, he will be focusing on starting new chapters and working with existing chapters that have recruitment problems. His first assignment will be to Kent State University in Kent, Ohio.



Benny was heavily involved at Iowa Beta, having served as GP, Fraternity Educator, and HI, to name a few. He was also heavily involved with ISU and Greek Community activities, having served on the Student Alumni Leadership Council, on Greek Week Central Committee, and as IFC VP for Judicial Affairs. Fraternity is in his blood, and he'll no doubt have a positive impact in his next role as well.

Benny becomes just the third member of our chapter to serve on the headquarters staff. Bill Good, '69-864, was employed there from 1972 to 1974, followed by Bob Wolter, '71-911, from 1974 to 1976.

Iowa Beta University Advisor Named One of "100 Very Eminent Psychologists"



Our chapter's University Advisor, psychologist Craig A. Anderson, IN Zeta (Butler) '74, was recently named to an elite list of eminent psychology researchers in *Archives of Scientific Psychology*. He is listed under the category of "100 Very Eminent Psychologists."

The researchers identified 200 eminent psychologists of the modern era. They analyzed the psychologists' citation impact, textbook citations, and major scientific awards.

Anderson is a Distinguished Professor in the Department of Psychology, an academic unit in the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences. He is also the director of ISU's Center for the Study of Violence.

His 200-plus publications span a wide range of topics, including judgment and decision-making; depression, loneliness, and shyness; personality theory and measurement; attribution theory; and human aggression. He is best known for his General Aggression Model, and his work on media violence. He is one of the most widely cited scholars in social psychology.

Anderson has been awarded Fellow status by the Association for Psychological Science, the Society of Experimental Social Psychologists, and the American Psychological Association, among others.

In accord with his new "eminent" status, Anderson was asked to write brief accounts of his major contributions for a forthcoming book on *Scientists Making a Difference: The Greatest Living Behavioral and Brain Scientists Talk about Their Most Important Contributions*.


2014 Donor Board



William R. Galloway, Jr., '49-507, died February 28, 2015. Bill was born in Waterloo, Iowa, in 1928, and after high school graduation joined the Navy. He volunteered for submarine service and served in the Pacific submarine fleet. An honors graduate of ISU, he was awarded membership in Phi Kappa Phi, the prestigious national honor society. Following graduation, he joined the DuPont Company where he worked in various capacities in engineering, manufacturing, marketing, and general management in seven different departments. During his career, he spent a number of years commercializing new products and technologies. After a series of U.S. assignments, he was transferred to Germany as works director of a new manufacturing facility producing Nylon and Dacron products. He was elected to the Board of Directors of the German National Chemical Industry Association and to the Board of a state-wide employers association. In 1973, Bill returned to the U.S. as Production Manager of the Dacron Division, and in 1974 was named Director



of Environmental Affairs as the chemical industry organized to deal more effectively with issues of chemicals and health. He and representatives from five other companies founded the Chemical Industry Institute of Toxicology, and he served on its first Board of Directors. In the early 1970s, he met with Iranian business executives to discuss whether a man-made textile fibers industry could be built in Iran. The venture would allow Iran to upgrade its most important natural resource, crude oil, to more valuable products. A new company was formed, and in 1976 Galloway moved to Iran as Managing Director of the Polyacryl Iran Corp. However, the chaos of the 1979 Iranian Revolution shut down the nation's infrastructure, and Bill left the day before the Shah fled the country. He returned to the U.S. to become DuPont's Director of Public Affairs and later Vice President of its industrial chemicals businesses. He took early retirement in 1985 to become Chief Executive of a joint venture in the United Kingdom. In late 1986, he returned to the U.S. to build a business in specialty chemicals and materials, pharmaceuticals, and environmental remediation. The company was the first in the world to introduce products to remove chlorofluorocarbons from the atmosphere, and developed a novel petroleum technology for the more efficient use of heavy hydrocarbons. In 1991, he received Iowa State University's College of Business Citation for outstanding achievements beyond the university, and in 1992 he received the University's Distinguished Achievement Citation for preeminent contributions to education, industry, and public service. A frequent spokesman for business and chemical industry groups, he also served as chairman of several trade associations. He was a senior member of the American Institute of Chemical Engineers and Managing Partner of Galloway-Ippen Farms. Bill was a Life Member of the United States Submarine Veterans of WWII and of the United States Submarine Veterans, Inc., an organization formed to include the post-WWII period. He was a mountain climber and a member of the Swiss Alpine Club and the American Alpine Club. In 2004, he was awarded a gold medal for scaling 100 of the 4,000-meter peaks in the Alps. He served several years as Chairman of the Board of the Peninsula Girl Scout Council. Bill is survived by his wife of 65 years, Gloria Olson Galloway, a lifelong journalist; their daughter, Cheryl Tanriverdi; and their son, Dr. William Galloway.

Charles A. Gates III, '52-582, of Mt. Pleasant, South Carolina, died at home surrounded by family on January 22, 2015. Born in 1933 in Chicago, Illinois, he served in the Army and graduated from Iowa State University, where he played football. In 1958 he married Barbara Anderson, his loving wife of 56 years, and they had three children. His career was in data processing, working primarily in the banking industry in Indianapolis. After retiring, he moved to Mt. Pleasant in 2001 and summered in Wisconsin at his beloved Fence Lake. Chuck was a devoted family man who loved golfing.
