Capital Campaign Update

In the Homecoming notice mailed last September, we announced that sufficient support had been received to enable the House Corporation to proceed with a \$1,000,000 initial phase of renovation. Our architects have developed plans for a complete renovation, broken down into logical steps so that work to be done in subsequent phases will fit with that done in the initial phase. Phasing the project will allow us to move our students back in the house earlier than would be the case if we were to wait until funding was secured in full.

We have had a tremendous response so far from a relatively small number of brothers. Thanks so much to the broth-

ers (and friends of Iowa Beta) listed below for providing the capital to take this important first step. This step is just that, a first step. The Campaign will continue until we have the funds to completely renovate the chapter house. We will surely succeed if everyone who cares makes a meaningful gift based on his particular circumstances.

Colony Gains Six New Men

Six new men have joined our colony this fall. We have our colony meetings every Sunday night and we usually have a social/recruitment event each week. During the fall, we tried to take advantage of the great front yard and volleyball pit as much as possible. Thanks to Jim Patchett '71 for buying a grill for us to use in connection with these events.

We would especially like to thank Dave Carlson '62 for providing us an apartment to use until the chapter house is ready to reoccupy. For those who haven't been to Ames lately, there is an apartment complex immediately north of our property on the lot that formerly contained the Baptist Church parsonage. At the August 22 Corporation Board meeting, Dave decided right then and there that we needed some place to call our own. He took it upon himself to locate, secure, and pay for a unit in the adjacent apartment complex. It has really worked out great. We use it not only for weekly meetings, but for social events, studying, and just hanging out. It also gives us the opportunity to keep an eye on the chapter house and lot, which we think is important, since vacant property in a college town is always a cause for concern. Thank you, Dave!

This fall, we implemented "Excellence Bound" scholarships at Iowa State. This is a program that has been used in recent years at many Phi Psi chapters to help recruit quality men. Scholarships are offered to freshmen and sophomores who are unaffiliated with any fraternity. The scholarships are awarded based on demonstrated achievement in academics, leadership, and community service. We received 75 applica-

tions and conducted 35 interviews. Finalists were then selected and a reception was held in the Memorial Union to honor the finalists and announce the winners. We awarded four \$250 scholarships and one \$500 scholarship. The scholarships were not conditional upon joining Phi Psi, but it gave us the opportunity to get in front of a number of qualified men and tell the Phi Psi story. We will be following up with a number of them.

(Editor's note: The money used to fund the scholarships came from earnings on the Iowa Beta Chapter Scholarship Fund (CSF) at the Fraternity's Endowment Fund. As you may recall, alumni donations made in the late 1990s to the Endowment Fund were used to form the Iowa Beta CSF. Those funds have been invested ever since, and the earnings each year are available for scholarships.)

We are very much looking forward to moving into the chapter house next fall. At a college like Iowa State, where all fraternities have houses, recruiting without a place to live is an uphill battle. Friendships and brotherhood are much easier to nurture when you see each other several times a day, seven days a week (as opposed to two to three times a week as is our case now). Moreover, planning events is much easier when you are in continuous contact with each other. We are neophytes in this business of fraternity, but we believe in the concepts of Phi Kappa Psi, and we appreciate the efforts of those alumni who are contributing time and money to give us the opportunity to bring Phi Kappa Psi back to Iowa State.

From the House Corporation Board President

Dear Brothers:

I hope this note finds you well as we head into the New Year, one which is certainly going to be very important for Phi Psi at Iowa State. It's full speed ahead on the renovation of our beloved historic chapter house. RDG Architects and Planners in Des Moines are completing the detailed plans and specifications for the house restoration. Brother Randy Minear's ('76) company in Des Moines, Terrus Real Estate Group, LLC, will serve as construction manager for the project. The first two construction activities, re-roofing and interior demolition, will likely be completed by the time this newsletter reaches you. The interior reconstruction activities will be moving forward immediately thereafter. Our goal is to have the first phase of construction completed and the house ready for occupancy by the beginning of the fall semester in August.

We remain committed to providing the highest quality living and educational environment possible for our undergraduate members. As such, the design and construction activities continue to move forward in accordance with the criteria outlined in the US Green Building Council's Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design (LEED) rating system, as described in our previous newsletter. As a reminder, LEED is a voluntary, consensus-based national standard for developing high-performance, sustainable buildings. The LEED design and construction process promotes the development of the highest quality living and working environments, exemplified by enhanced indoor air quality, increased energy efficiency, use of recycled or locally harvested renewable building resources, adaptive reuse of existing infrastructure, and state-of-the-art innovations in water resource management and landscape conservation. If we are successful, I believe this may be the first LEED-certified fraternity or sorority house in the nation.

It is our intent that the project serve as an educational outreach tool, not only for our chapter, but also for the university, the community, and beyond. It will also be an outstanding demonstration project for Phi Kappa Psi at the National level. We hope to attract a wide variety of undergraduate members by providing

unparalleled educational opportunities for research and study. We are already exploring opportunities to create partnerships with various university departments, including a variety of faculty and staff, to promote ongoing research and educational outreach throughout the design process and particularly in the post-construction operational stages of the house. We intend to set ourselves apart in the competitive housing environment at Iowa State today by creating an outstanding living and learning environment, coupled with a setting that provides the best qualities of fraternity life.

Funding remains one of our most critical priorities. At this stage, it appears we do not have enough funds to complete the full build-out of the existing house, let alone the expansion of the third floor wings as outlined in our renovation plans. Many of you may have been reluctant to commit until it was apparent that the re-colonization and house restoration efforts were for real. I can certainly appreciate such reluctance, but we are moving forward, and the time to step forward with support is now. Not everyone is able, but if you are, no matter how large or small, each contribution is both needed and greatly appreciated. Please direct any questions to brother Bill Good, who continues to serve as our Capital Campaign coordinator. Thanks so much to everyone who has made a pledge to date, and also to our era and class captains who are volunteering their time toward this effort.

It was great to see old friends and brothers during Homecoming in October. Although the turnout wasn't huge, it was enthusiastic. My goal for Homecoming 2006 is to celebrate the restoration of our house and brotherhood with the largest alumni turnout in the history of our Iowa Beta Chapter. Details on this and other activities will be forthcoming. that moving could be accomplished with ease. Fred, Sr., was in charge of furnishing the kitchen. He was initiated by the Phi Psi chapter at Beloit College in Wisconsin, but World War I intervened, and after a brief stint in the Army, he transferred to Iowa State College. He moved into the Phi Psi house at 503 Grand Avenue and transferred his membership to Iowa Beta. At Iowa State, Fred made many friends, met a Tri Delt (Ione Steigle), and fell in love. After graduation, he married Ione and started his teaching career. His friends moved on, too, but stayed in touch and were the cornerstones in his life.

Tom Bushnell said, "My dad, Mal, always spoke of his Phi Psi days and his friendships in the fraternity. Those friends were something special, because we moved a lot while he was a career naval officer."

Fred Bushnell, Jr. '49, his four sons, Rick '73, John '74, Cade '78, and Ned, together with Tom Bushnell, son of Malcolm Bushnell, Illinois Delta '52, have made a pledge to dedicate a study room in the refurbished chapter house in memory of Fred Bushnell, Sr. '21, who died in 1990, and in memory of Malcolm, who died in 2005. "It was an easy decision; Dad was such a loyal Phi Psi that we put "Phi Kappa Psi" on his headstone," said Fred Jr.

In the 1920s, the economy was booming. The Phi Kappa Psi house at 316 Lynn was in the last stages of construction. All of the chapter members took on commitments so

"We couldn't do anything better — as a family of "brothers in many ways" — than honor Grandpa and Mal this way," commented Cade, Ned, and John.

"Our grandfather and our Uncle Mal were wonderful fellows. Grandpa and Malcolm kept their fraternity vows, which were forever part of who they were. It is our hope that other Phi Psi families will choose to put together a donation to the chapter house where their memories were made, and that this effort will bring back a wonderful chapter to the ISU campus. So, we ask others to join us," Rick challenged.

Obituaries

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John L. Evans, '35-233, died August 12, 2005, at age 90. Born in 1915 in Emerson, Iowa, he graduated from Emerson High School, Wentworth Military Academy Junior College, and Iowa State, where he played football. On November 19, 1939, he married Margaret "Mickie" Young in Red Oak, Iowa. She survives. Jack worked at a variety of jobs in the Emerson and Red Oak areas. He belonged to the First Congregational United Church of Christ and numerous civic organizations. During the flood of 1982, he served as mayor of Emerson. The family includes three sons, David, E. John, and Thomas; a daughter, Nancy Dalton; 14 grandchildren; and 20 great-grandchildren.

Thomas W. Giner, '36-242, of Renwick, Iowa, passed away January 26, 2005. He was born March 16, 1918.

David W. Middleton, '36-251, died August 24, 2005, at the age of 91. He was born March 14, 1914. Brother Middleton lived in Richland, Washington.

Laurence E. Owens, '39-389, died February 12, 2002. A resident of Vista, California, he was born May 22, 1918.

C. Hess Peters, '42-338, of Papillion, Nebraska, passed away January 26, 2003. He was born October 28, 1923.

Wayne F. Hicks, '48-467, died July 18, 2005, after a long battle with cancer. Born September 13, 1927, in Mason City, Iowa, he attended school there until sixth grade, when his family moved to El Paso, Texas. He graduated from Austin High School there in 1945. He then served in the US Navy on an aircraft carrier. After his service, brother Hicks attended Iowa State for three years. On Dec. 28, 1949, he married his college sweetheart, Paula Marcusen. She survives. He spent his working career in the oil industry, living in several heartland cities, and retiring from BP Amoco. After retiring, Wayne owned and operated Lake Sport Shop in Clear Lake, Iowa. He belonged to Galilean Lutheran Church in that city. In addition to his wife, brother Hicks is survived by his daughters, Deborah Hyland, Janna McQuinn, and Melinda Wilson; his son, Jeff; nine grandchildren; and one great-grandchild.

Allan V. Wind, '48-472, passed away January 14, 2005. Born December 2, 1924, in Clear Lake, Iowa, he graduated from Clear Lake High School and Mason City Junior College. He then served in the US Army during WWII, and, after being discharged, he attended Iowa State, graduating with a BS in engineering. During the Korean conflict, Allan was recalled to active duty. Until 1960, he worked as assistant city engineer of Clear Lake. His next job involved a move to Prairie Village, Kansas, where brother Wind worked for Armco Steel. Soon after retiring in 1986, he and his wife returned to Clear Lake to be nearer family and friends. Allan enjoyed golf, feeding birds, the companionship of his dogs, watching sports, and especially spending time with his family. He was active in Boy Scouts and the various churches he belonged to. He also belonged to Veterans of Foreign Wars and professional engineering associations. Survivors include his wife, Betty; his son, Peter; his daughters, Melissa Wilson and Kristi Greven; three grandchildren; and other relatives.

Donald M. Davis, '48-486, of Fort Myers, Florida, died January 8, 2005. He was born June 16, 1926.

Raymond P. Henely, '50-523, of Trenton, Missouri, died April 11, 2005, of cancer. Born March 3, 1928, he worked as a highway engineer, and later as director of AGC of Iowa, reports his wife, Margaret, who notified the alumni office. Brother Henely enjoyed playing golf. He is survived by four children, Kathi, Karen, John, and Ann, all of whom reside in Iowa. Mrs. Heneley wrote that she planned to return to that state.

Joel C. Hanes, '50-528, died September 14, 2005, after a long struggle with cancer. Born Aug. 22, 1929, in Mason City, Iowa, and graduated from Mason City High School. He then graduated from Mason City Junior College before enrolling at Iowa State. He earned his business degree in 1951. Brother Hanes spent most of his life in Mason City, though he lived lakeside at Clear Lake from 1975-93. On Sept. 8, 1951, he married Joyce Reinke in Cedar Rapids, Iowa. She survives. He worked with his grandfather in the 40s and then in the family business, Yelland and Hanes, from 1947-61. During the remainder of the 1960s, he traveled several Midwestern States selling office supplies. In 1969, Joel and his brother, Edward, bought Yelland and Hanes from their mother and aunt. The next year, he and other relatives founded Midwest Wholesale, Inc., an office supply wholesaler. Brother Hanes remained active in this enterprise until he retired in 1998. He was an

active member of several trade associations and in many community organizations, including the Masons. In recent years, he bought land in several Iowa counties so that he could restore prairies and wetlands. In 1999, Joel and Joyce were recognized as Conservationists of the Year by Floyd County. He was active in several conservation organizations, and in 1996, he participated in an International Crane Foundation work/study group that studied black-necked cranes in China. In addition to his wife, survivors include his son, Joel; his daughters, Susan Helle, Ann Hanes, Carol Kelly, Kay Ehlers, and Linda Hanes; six grandchildren; a brother, Edward; sisters, Dorothy Stone and Barbara Roberts; and many nieces and nephews.

William H. Buse, '50-544, of Sunrise Beach, Missouri, passed away May 26, 2005. Born August 15, 1928, in Madison, Wisconsin, he grew up in Cedar Rapids, Iowa. He was a retired US Air Force captain. As a teen, brother Buse became an Eagle Scout and later served as Scoutmaster at Central Presbyterian Church in Des Moines. He belonged to a number of civic organizations. Survivors include his wife, Eleanor; his daughters, Cindy Kirklin, Claudia Buse, Nora Buse, and Susan Buse; his brother, **Frederick "Bud" Buse, '52-563**; five stepsisters; 12 grandchildren; a great-grandson; and many nieces and nephews.

Conrad W. "Wes" Randall, '55-643, and his wife, Nancy, died in a plane crash on January 15, 2006, when their single-engine Beechcraft airplane went down in heavy rain near the Irazú volcano, in the Tapas mountains east of San José, Costa Rica. A group of rescuers found the Des Moines, Iowa, couple and the wreckage of their plane on January 17. Bad weather had delayed the search after residents in the area had reported seeing the plane flying low in heavy rain, and then a crash, on January 15. Wes and Nancy were on a two-week excursion with the Baja Bush Pilot, a national group of recreational pilots that has sponsored the trip for more than 25 years. It was the first time Wes (69) and Nancy (68) had participated in the trip, family members said. Their son, Conrad Randell, was in Costa Rica following the story as it unfolded in news reports. Karl D. Dewey, '91-1254, of Denver, Colorado, died at home July 14, 2005. He was 33. Born October 17, 1971, in Lexington, Nebraska, he attended schools in Lincoln, Nebraska, and Waterloo, Iowa.
