

Academics

Our chapter GPA for spring semester was 3.22, placing us sixth among IFC fraternities. This is our highest grade point since rechartering, although not our highest ranking. Our nine new members this spring had a 3.45 GPA, first among new-member classes of IFC fraternities! Twenty-eight men had a 3.50 or higher, with three men getting a perfect 4.00 — Matt Hodges, Will Noack, and Jackson Scholten.

Brother Cody West Elected Student Government President



This year's national election may have been exciting, but we experienced quite the election year of our own here at 316 Lynn. Our brother, Cody West, '16-1503, secured the bid for 2017-2018 Student Government President after a long month of campaigning. His running mate, Cody Smith, is a senior in Political Science from Crawfordsville, Indiana, who lived just down the hall from West his freshman year.

Brother West is originally from Altoona, Iowa, and will be a senior in Biology this fall. Upon graduation, he hopes to attend medical school and eventually return to Iowa to practice medicine.

Although you may be wondering what a biology major is doing running for Student Government President, West likes to point out how he enjoys progressing initiatives revolving around student wellness that relate to his future goals. Whether it was serving as Student Government Vice-President last year, a Senator for the College of Agriculture and Life Sciences the year before that, or on countless university committees, he has always done his part to make Iowa State a better place.

This year's election turnout was higher than in recent years with over 24% of the student body participating. West and Smith secured 54% of the overall vote, receiving nearly 1,000 more votes than their competition. The campaign consisted of visiting numerous student organizations, content on every social media platform known to man, tabling on campus, and covering campus sidewalks in chalk. Countless brothers took time out of their daily routines to help with the campaign. West believes the support of his brothers — including those alumni brothers who helped with financial contributions — made all the difference in the result of the election.

During his time in office, he hopes to restore tradition at Iowa State, in the absence of VEISHEA. West has noticed the need for a unifying celebration that brings all members of the Iowa State community together, and is in the process of planning a series of events and activities that will showcase the success of Iowa State while providing an opportunity for alumni to return and take pride in where they received their education. Other agenda items include addressing campus sexual assault, residency issues in Ames, and securing more state funding for Iowa State University.

Brother West is honored to have the opportunity to serve his fellow students and represent Phi Kappa Psi over the coming year.

Spring 2017 Most Valuable Brothers: Zach Nickles and Alex Lev

The chapter chose Zach Nickles, '13-1465 (R), and Alex Lev, '16-1508 (L), as the spring 2017 recipients of the Most Valuable Brother Awards.

Zach is a senior from Edwards, Illinois, pursuing a degree in supply chain management. During his time in the fraternity, he has been a stalwart builder of Homecoming and Greek Week displays, props, and you-name-it. On campus he has been involved with Dance Marathon, Delta Sigma Pi business fraternity, Business Council, Supply Chain Club, and Engineering Week.



Alex is a sophomore from Eagan, Minnesota, majoring in Software Engineering. He was the chapter's Homecoming co-chair last fall and the yearlong recruitment chairman this past year, doing an excellent job of recruiting throughout the school year. Outside of Phi Psi, he has held leadership positions with the Engineering Career Fair and the Iowa State Blood Drive.

Both Zach and Alex are brothers who have done far more for the chapter than this brief summary indicates. They are solid brothers worthy of these awards.

The Most Valuable Brother Award is a \$1,000 scholarship given to the undergraduate who has made the most positive impact on the chapter during the semester, as determined by his peers. The positive impact made by the recipient must fall within the parameters of the four pillars of the Greek Community at Iowa State, i.e., scholarship, friendship, leadership, and service. Two awards are presented each semester, one to an underclassman (first or second year of college) and one to an upperclassman (third year of college or above).

The inaugural MVB Awards were presented spring semester of 2013 as a result of the generosity of James P. Grabenbauer, '73-948, and Jerry A. Soper, '73-956, who have provided funding for these awards for the first six years.

Spotlight on: James R. Reynolds, '71-930

I grew up in Muscatine, Iowa. Even though I told everybody that I was never coming back after college, I quickly discovered it was not such a bad place.

Some friends and I ran into Terry King, '70-1408, also from Muscatine, during my senior year in high school when he was back home over Christmas break. It was New Years Eve and he was driving around with three beautiful girls in his VW Beetle. During the course of the evening, he was telling my friends and me about the Phi Psi house. I seem to remember him saying there were beautiful girls around the house all the time. He invited us up for Greek Week and VEISHEA, and I was sold. When I went back for fall rush, I pledged right away and have never had any regrets. Terry became my pledge dad.

I studied Chemical Engineering at Iowa State. Terry was also a Chem. E major, which was very convenient. He used to drag me to the library to study.

I worked my way through college, working all vacations for my father, who had a home improvement business. He also bought and remodeled apartment houses with my grandfather. In Ames, I worked as a waiter in sororities and as a maintenance man for one of the big landlords in Ames.

In January of my sophomore year, I met Carla Zimmerman at an FAC (Friday Afternoon Club) we had with Alpha Gamma Delta. We started dating a couple of weeks later and have been together ever since. We will celebrate our 42nd anniversary in August.

By the time I started my junior year, I was becoming interested in business. I decided that I wanted to get an MBA after graduating from ISU, so I took business and economics classes for my electives and graduated from ISU with the same credits toward an MBA that the regular business students did.

I was one of the first ISU students to study abroad when I took Chemical Engineering classes at University College in London, England, the summer following my junior year. That trip helped develop my interest in international business. That is also where I had my first brush with terrorism. I was a very serious photographer at the time. My friends and I were going to visit the Tower of London one day, but when I got up, the weather was dreary. I told my friends that I was not going because my photos would not turn out well. None of us went that day, and that was the day the IRA bombed the Tower of London.

After graduating in 1975, I took an engineering job with Grain Processing Corp. (GPC) in Muscatine and started on my MBA at Iowa.

When I had worked at GPC for about two years, my father and I began looking for business investments. We discovered that there was a severe shortage of building insulation because Jimmy Carter was trying to get Americans to insulate all of their homes during the Energy Crisis following the Arab Oil Embargo. We decided to start manufacturing cellulose insulation in Muscatine, beginning production in the fall of 1977.

Although we had originally intended to be absentee owners, we quickly realized that the business was too complicated for that, so we both changed careers and dove in. We also hired my pledge son, Mark Hall ('73-950), to help with sales and management of the plant. Cellulose insulation is made from recycled newspapers mixed with fire retardant chemicals. It seemed like the perfect product — it was as "green" as you could get and was used to save energy.

All went pretty well until the Farm Crisis started in 1980. The Federal Reserve had tightened its monetary policy in 1979,



causing interest rates to go sky high, and Jimmy Carter told the Russians that we weren't going to sell them any more corn. The price of corn and farmland in the Corn Belt dropped dramatically. Since Iowa is the center of the Corn Belt, and much of the agricultural equipment is built near here, the midwestern economy quickly started to suffer the greatest downturn since the Depression. Bright young college graduates could not find jobs around here, so they were forced to move away to start their careers. New home construction came to a stop, so many of the carpenters, plumbers, and electricians moved away. The only market for insulation was for weatherizing older homes, but that was not enough volume to make our

plant very profitable.

When I finished my MBA in 1982, I found myself with a lot of extra time on my hands, so I decided to spend the next several years trying to develop a whole new generation of cellulose insulation products. I made a lot of progress, but by 1986, I came to the conclusion that I was just wasting my time waiting for them to start building houses in the upper Midwest again. I did not realize at the time that it would take 29 years, until 2009, for the population of Iowa to get back to the same level it was in 1980. We decided to shut the business down. I rebuilt all of the manufacturing equipment and sold it to friends of mine in the insulation industry in other parts of the country that were not affected by the Farm Crisis.

In the process, I discovered that I liked working with equipment more than making insulation every day. I spent a few years consulting in engineering and business, and then started buying and rebuilding used manufacturing equipment.

That led me to start my current business, Reynolds Engineering & Equipment, Inc., in Muscatine. We manufacture industrial processing equipment, specializing in size reduction (grinding and pulverizing) equipment. We supply most of the key pieces of equipment used by cellulose insulation manufacturers in North America and Europe, and also produce equipment for many other industries, including ingredients for human food (spices, dietary fiber, whole grain flours, and gluten free products), pet food (plant protein flours), and aquaculture (especially food for farm-raised shrimp and larval fish). We now have customers in 40 countries on 6 continents. I am in charge of sales, so I spend a lot of time traveling to identify opportunities and ways we can help our customers.

Each year, we have a high school engineering intern and teach the intern to do real engineering work. One of our recent interns was Iowa Betan David Mathis, '12-1439.

Both of these businesses have been very demanding. Carla and I were not able to have children, so I put most of my energy into my businesses. It has been pretty challenging being a manufacturer in the U.S., especially being tied to the housing industry so closely, but I have generally enjoyed the challenges and never get caught up or bored.

I would say that being a Phi Psi had a profound effect on my life. I became very involved in management of the chapter, serving as house manager (maintenance of the house), assistant treasurer, treasurer, and president. I often think that I learned as much about life and business from my Phi Psi experience as I learned from my classes at Iowa State. It was a real life "learning lab." It was like getting two educations at the same time. It also created the opportunity for me to meet Carla. My Phi Psi experience helped to

give me the confidence to leave corporate America when I was 23 years old and strike out on my own. I had many great friends in the house, and I try to stop to see some of them as I travel across the country.

When Bill Good came to see me about the rebirth of the chapter, I decided to make a contribution right away. When I learned how involved he and Lindy were going to be, both financially and with their time, I knew that I had to help. I saw it as a unique opportunity to get the chapter going again, with a pretty good chance of success. Many people before me had created the opportunity I enjoyed, and I wanted to do my part to help create the same opportunity for future men at Iowa State.

I wish it were easier to visit Ames and the house more often. I normally work 6-7 days a week, so it is hard to get to Ames. I am very proud to see how Phi Psi has become a major chapter in the ISU Greek system again. I know that it took a great amount of dedication and work by Bill and Lindy Good, and I will forever be grateful for their service. I would also like to thank the young men who had the will and the courage to restart the chapter.
